Kareem Crayton J.D. Stanford, Ph.D. Political Science, Stanford

Kareem Crayton is Associate Professor of Law at University of North Carolino School of Law. He is one of the country's most innovative researchers whose work integrates law, politics and race. He is one of the few academics with formal skills in Jaw and political Science whose work addresses the relationship between race and politics in representative institutions. The insights from Professor Crayton's research have distinguished him as a leading value in the academy and in public institution. His is commentary: insight, and analysis regularly appear in major media outlets including The New York Times, PSS, and Fox News, Professor Crayton also served as the lead author on an Amicus Curiae Brief For the Supreme Court in Shelpy Country & Holder.



Richard I. Hasen is Chancellor's Professor of Law and Political Science at the University of California. Irvine Hasen is a nationally recognized expert in election law and comparing Finance regulation, and is ac author of a leading casebook on election law. His op-eds and commentaries have apported in many publications, including The New York Times. The Washington Post Politico, and Slate Hasen also writes the often-quoted Election Law Blog. His newest book. The Voting Wars: From Florida 2000 to the Next Election Meldown, was published in summer 2012 by Yala University Press.
